You will be reading *Jane Eyre* by Charlotte Bronte this summer. Be prepared for a timed writing based on your reading on the first day of class.

Pace your reading. This is a long book. Putting the reading off until the end of summer is not a good idea.

I would suggest annotating the text as you read. Pay particular attention to character and plot. Highlight memorable quotes, use of figurative language, and any other point of interest.

Begin to fill in the **MWDS (major works data sheet)**. Only fill out the characters, plot summary, and author background sections. Those are the areas I will be grading.
